**"NAYD CAMEROON
Makes a Giant Step Ahead
Shaping its Future"**

On the 30th of June 2007 at the "HEALTH FOR ALL FOUNDATION" premises in Buea, South west Province of Cameroon, NAYD Cameroon held its very first meeting. This meeting although onerous was successful as a number of giant steps and decision that will guide the future of the organisation positively were reached at. This meeting witnessed the presence and active participation of the following member organisations of NAYD Cameroon; ICCHRA-CAMEROON, BAPESU, MAYA INITIATIVES, AHURTOD, POSSCUB, CACEPED INTERNATIONAL, GREENPLANET CIG, YECEDAT CIG, GOAHEAD and PAID-WA. Both the country coordinator for NAYD Cameroon Chi Primus and CEO of NAYD INTERNATIONAL and Member of NAYD Cameroon (POCHI TAMBA) who was also present appealed on all to keep unselfish and vested or hush-hush interests aside and work for a common goal in helping to bring change towards the lives of all the people of Africa. She appreciated the enormous efforts so far this year by every one in making the newly born baby (NAYD) to grow. An issue treated at the meeting that went all day long was an adoption of a constitution for the organisation.

Some of the major resolutions attained at were:

- Candidates vying for any post of Responsibility in NAYD Cameroon Office must be 70% active in attendance of meetings.
- Those present at the first meeting were considered as founding members.
- Each youth member association will be represented maximally by one person and one vote in general assembly.
- NAYD Cameroon will create Honorary Membership. These honorary members will include public gurus, celebrities, and successful people in various walks of life/role models. NAYD-Cameroon will use these persons to hinge for support in fundraising and promoting its image

- NAYD Cameroon will be registered in Yaoundé and its head office shall be Yaoundé the political capital of Cameroon
- Some priority programs will be put in place since the network is still at the incipient stage of existence and subsumes capacity building programs on leadership, group organigram, structuring, organizational development, and grant writing
- Some thematic areas of intervention or department were set to take charge of respective projects as they apply. These department are namely: Health & HIV/AIDS, Governance and Human rights, Environment and Nature conservation, Education, Communication and Information Technology (ICT)
- A project bank will be set up whereby projects will be taken and submitted for sponsoring when the opportunity arises.

A robust bureau to lead the activities of the organisation for the next two years was set up through transparent voting and the outcome gave the post of responsibility to *CHI Primus* as Country Coordinator, *Dr. Walters SAMAH* as Administrative Officer, *SHEY Aloysius* as Program Officer, *NKEM Bellami* as Finance Officer, *Raoul NTCHANKOUNTE* as Treasurer, *Christian PHUEBONG TABIFOR* as Communication and Public Relations Officer. Provincial Coordinators will be put in place on rolling basis. Talks during the meeting also centred on the Formation of a Cameroon Youth Parliament as a means to lobby and foster youth problems.

The conference participants had the opportunity to receive brief but very informative and vital talk from Pochi TAMBA (MAYA Initiatives) on the imperative elements to consider when setting up a project (**SWOT**: S=Strength, W=Weaknesses, O=Opportunities, T=Threats). Dr. Walters SAMAH (CAPED International) presented a paper on the situation of Civil Society Organizations in Cameroon which depicts it as with enormous conundrums which include inconsistency, inactive, lack of credibility, lack of volunteerism spirit.

NAYD CAMEROON defined an action plan for 2007 in terms of priorities and subsumes: the establishment of final copy of NAYD Cameroon Constitution, the

legalization/registration of NAYD Cameroon, the making of Internal Rules and Regulations, the establishment of a bank account with any reputable bank with *Country Coordinator, Finance Officer, and Treasurer* as mandated co-signatories, the establishment of a Board of Directors (*selection criteria, short listed candidates, executive meeting for selection, and nomination letters*) and the setting up of an Office Space in Yaoundé. At the end of the meeting the Coordinator goaded everyone in the team and NAYD Cameroon family to work unceasingly, unreservedly, unselfishly and with dire passion to achieve success.

Country Coordinator: Presides meetings, takes charge of the day-to-day operation and management of the network.; chief liaison officer and principal spokesman of the network;

collaborate with other organizations in formulating, encouraging and promoting policies, programmes, and activities; ensure the proper execution of the action plans and the budget; enforce the implementation of the constitution, and rules and regulations of the network; provide direction and leadership through service to other members and be a co-signatory of the bank account(s) of the network; performs other duties assigned by the GA, BODs and Regional and International Offices of NAYD.



Dr. Walters SAMAH

Administrative Officer: Coordinates the recruitment of members into the network and keeps an up-to-date list of such members; records and keep minutes including

attendance and summary of all decisions taken during any meeting; He in consultation with the country coordinator writes and dispatches circulars, letters and other correspondences of the network and keeps a record of such correspondences; assumes the role of the country coordinator in his/her absence and performs any other duties assigned by the country coordinator and the GA.



Christian P. TABIFOR

Communication and Public Relations Officer: Is the principal advertising and marketing manager of the network. He prepares and presents all publicity gadgets/materials for

the network. He in consultation with the EC prepares and sanctions the materials required for posting on the NAYD website. He is the principal liaison officer between the network and the NAYD webmaster. He coordinates the activities of any editorial committee/publications of the network. Regularly updates the NAYD INTERNATIONAL Communication/Public Relations Officer on country office activities/events for publication on the NAYD website and newsletter. Performs other duties assigned by the country coordinator and GA.



NKEM Bellami

Finance Officer: Serves as the overall financial manager to the entire network's projects; keeps clear and accurate financial reports/accounts of all receipts and disbursements

of the network and make them available upon request to the appropriate authorities; draws up annual financial reports on income and expenditure accounts of the network; prepares payment vouchers of all financial transactions before disbursement and be a co-signatory to the network's bank account(s).



Raoul NTCHANKOUNTE

Treasurer: Chief custodians of all funds belonging to the network, which shall be secured in any financial institution designated by the General

Assembly (GA); receives and disburses in accordance with the EC all funds belonging to the network; a co-signatory to the network's bank account(s), alongside the country coordinator and finance officer.

SHEY Aloysius

Programme Officer: Serves as the overall manager of all network projects. Coordinate the capacity building of member associations, through the conception and organization of workshops, seminars and conferences; maintains accurate and up-to-date inventory of all furniture, equipment/property of the network; supervises all employees of the network, promptly report to the EC vacancies and recommend suitable persons to fill such vacancies; submits monthly reports on

country projects to the Project Director of NAYD INTERNATIONAL; coordinates the activities of the various divisions of the network and perform any other duties assigned by the country coordinator and GA. ■

CAPED-International Organizes Peace & Dialogue Conference

On July 4, 2007, the Campus for Peace & Dialogue (CAPED) International organized a conference in Yaoundé on the theme "Building a Culture of Peace & Dialogue in African Higher Institutions of Learning", with special focus on best practices, models and strategies. This Conference was a follow-up of an earlier one commenced on 28 May 2007, but was suspended due to unexpected circumstances. Given that international participants had already presented their papers during the May conference, this extended conference was devoted to national participants.



Considering the context that has prevailed within the past two decades, in which most African universities have become hot beds for violence, it was hoped that through open debate, this conference would foster understanding and tolerance among members of the university community. Hence, the principal objective of the conference was to bring together scholars and professionals from various backgrounds and disciplines as well as student leaders to reflect on and scientifically try to understand the dynamics of conflict and violence in tertiary education. During the opening ceremony, the Chair of the Organizing Committee, Dr Walters Samah, after acknowledging the presence of participants and thanking them for their great interest in the conference, declared that to put an end to the ugly trend of conflict on campuses there must be changes in practices and not principles. He also stated that because peace is expensive, its pursuit should not be a dramatic event but a gradual process, which calls for the participation of all. His address was followed by a report on the May Conference that ended prematurely presented by the *Rapporteur*,

Charles Linjap. After the opening ceremony, guest speaker after guest speaker took their turns on the panel to present papers. Notable amongst them were Prof Bopda Athanase, Drs ESD Fomin, Ebale M. Chandel, Jean Koufan, Commissaire Clifford Mbaku Alawadi Zelao, Mboe Georges and student leaders, Walter Onekon, François Desire Mbesse and Awal Mohamadou. Some of the striking issues addressed included: the concept of peace, environment and peace on campus, the sexually-transmissible marks syndrome, student unionism, peacekeeping operations on campus, religion and cultism on campuses and crisis management in state universities.

The first panel comprising Prof. Bopda, Dr Fomin and Alawadi provided a comprehensive outline of peace, emphasising the need to always use and consider its extended concept which transcends the mere absence of open violence to include conditions of justice and needs fulfillment. One of the papers that drew much attention was that of the *Commissaire Mbaku*, titled: *'Effects and unintended consequences of peacekeeping and peace enforcement on university campuses'*. The speaker was highly appreciated for its openness and frankness. It was a remarkable paper which contributed quite strongly in sensitising conference participants about the role the security forces are expected to play during peace operations on campus. The paper demonstrated that previous peace operations on campuses have been poorly carried out, leading to unwanted outcomes. As a remedy, the Speaker recommended the use of 'community policing', a modern that warrants that the police should work in partnership with students and the university administration to defuse tension and prevent conflict from erupting. The conference was concluded with the reading of the conference report and recommendations. A major recommendation was a call for university authorities to prioritise and mainstream peace on their agenda. It is left for the decisions makers to make use of the recommendations towards a more peaceful university environment. ■

Gagnant du concours de prise en charge de la Francophonie

prise en charge lancé par la Francophonie et concernant la participation au 12^e Colloque Internationale d'Evaluation Environnementale et au colloque d'Eté de Genève, qui se sont respectivement, du 12-14 juin 2007 et du 18-22 juin 2007. A cet effet, Mlle Safia Omar Abdillahi a représenté notre ONG à prendre part à cette importante rencontre environnementale du monde francophone.

Une Conférence Internationale de la Jeunesse Africaine sur une Paix Durable

Une Conférence Internationale de la Jeunesse Africaine sur une Paix Durable, s'est ouvert à Djibouti, du 21-23 juin 2007 sous le Haut Patronage du Président de la République de Djibouti, Son Excellence Monsieur Ismail Omar Guelleh.

Initiée par l'Alliance des Jeunes pour la Paix en Afrique (AJPA), en collaboration avec les autorités djiboutiennes, cette rencontre aura été l'occasion, pour les représentants de différents Etats africains, de se pencher sur les voies et moyens d'impliquer la jeunesse au règlement des conflits en Afrique.

Ayant pour thème central : "Jeunesse africaine pour une paix durable en Afrique", la conférence de Djibouti a permis d'exhorter les jeunes du continent à plus de responsabilités dans leur comportement.

Douze sous- thèmes en rapport avec la jeunesse africaine ont ainsi été traités au cours de cette conférence dont les travaux se sont poursuivis jusqu'au 23 juin.

Selon le président de l'AJPA, Diaby Youssouf, ce sont les jeunes qui servent de main d'œuvre aux Occidentaux pour l'exécution de leur "sale" besogne : celle d'ensanglanter l'Afrique. "Dans 38 pays sur les 53 que compte le continent africain, il y a eu de 1961 à 2005, par la complicité des jeunes, quatre-vingt neuf (89) coups d'Etat effectivement réussis, ayant entraîné soit la mort du Président déchu, soit son départ en exil, soit son emprisonnement", a-t-il ajouté.

"Et la palme revient aux pays francophones, avec 47 coups d'Etat militaires", a insisté M.Diaby Youssouf. D'où le choix de Djibouti, le seul pays francophone faisant jusque-là exception, pour l'organisation de cette conférence.

"Estimant que l'Afrique dispose de nombreux cerveaux désireux de se consacrer à son

développement", le président de l'AJPA a souligné, en filigrane, qu'il faudrait mettre en place une structure panafricaine regroupant toutes les associations de jeunes afin qu'elles puissent œuvrer pour une paix durable.

Le Président Guelleh a, quant à lui, salué les aspirations des jeunes africains en vue de promouvoir la paix en Afrique, ajoutant que celle-ci n'est pas un comportement inné mais plutôt un comportement acquis et fortifié.

S'adressant aux représentants de la jeunesse africaine, le chef de l'Etat a souligné que "la paix est un impératif non négligeable, c'est le socle sur lequel vous pouvez bâtir vos rêves, vos projets et vos réalités".

"C'est le point de départ de vos aspirations, de vos désirs et de votre devenir. C'est pourquoi il nous faut une paix durable, c'est un impératif catégorique, moral et éthique en même temps" a-t-il ajouté.

Un atelier sur la Santé de la Jeunesse

La salle de conférence de l'IGAD abrite depuis hier un atelier de consultation des jeunes organisé par le ministère de la Santé avec le soutien technique et financier du FNUAP. Cet atelier, axé sur la promotion de la santé des adolescents et des jeunes, a réuni une cinquantaine de jeunes issus de différents quartiers et régions du pays. Il a été ouvert par le secrétaire général du ministère de la santé, le Dr Salah Bonoita et par la représentante du FNUAP. Durant deux jours, ces jeunes sont amenés à réfléchir sur les voies et moyens d'améliorer leur santé.

Le but de l'atelier ouvert hier au siège de l'IGAD et auquel participent plusieurs dizaines de jeunes djiboutiens venus de tous les quartiers de la capitale et de toutes les régions du pays est de prendre l'avis des jeunes à propos de leurs besoins et préoccupations et de les faire participer au processus de conception du plan stratégique de promotion de leur santé. Les objectifs spécifiques assignés à cet événement sont d'établir un état des lieux des préoccupations et besoins des adolescents et des jeunes en matière de santé avec eux et pour eux. Il s'agit aussi de les amener à se prononcer sur les réponses et prestations existantes. A la fin des travaux, les jeunes et les animateurs de l'atelier formuleront ensemble des recommandations susceptibles de protéger et

de promouvoir la santé des adolescents et des jeunes.

Ces recommandations seront utilisées lors de l'atelier de planification stratégique qui sera organisé par le Ministère de la Santé en collaboration avec les différents départements et partenaires samedi prochain au centre de conférence Kulaan.

Aujourd'hui, le monde compte la plus grande génération d'adolescents et de jeunes jamais connue. Ils sont à peu près 1 milliard de personnes âgées entre 15 et 24 ans. Cette période de la vie, du passage de l'enfance à l'âge adulte, connaît des changements qui aboutissent à la maturation physique, affective et sexuelle.

La population djiboutienne se caractérise par sa jeunesse : les jeunes constituent 60% de la population et ceux de moins de 15 ans forment près de 40% de la population. A l'instar des autres pays, Djibouti connaît aujourd'hui des dynamiques de changement qui affectent d'une manière ou d'une autre les structures sociales dont la famille, le mode de vie, l'éducation, la santé, les attitudes, les comportements et même les valeurs. Ce changement est à l'origine d'une nouvelle demande d'encadrement multidimensionnel y compris dans le domaine de la santé.

En effet, Les adolescents et les jeunes sont victimes d'une vulnérabilité grandissante liée à la pauvreté, le chômage, l'analphabétisme, l'abandon scolaire, les IST/SIDA, la violence, le tabac, le kat, les grossesses précoces et les avortements clandestins et autres fléaux. Voici en résumé les principales activités de la jeunesse dans notre pays. L'humanité fait face aujourd'hui à de graves problèmes environnementaux tels que la concentration accrue des gaz à effet de serre dans l'atmosphère, le changement climatique, l'appauvrissement de la couche d'ozone stratosphérique, la raréfaction des ressources en eau douce et la pollution croissante de l'atmosphère et des eaux.

Et ce sont les pays les plus vulnérables qui en souffrent le plus.

Les réalités de vie de misère et les difficultés de vie quotidienne dans le monde constituent toujours les points importants dont il faut nécessairement chercher et trouver solutions.

La créativité, les idéaux et le courage de la jeunesse du monde devraient être mobilisés pour forger un partenariat global afin de réaliser un développement soutenable et d'assurer un meilleur futur pour tous.
